# *Tree trimming* and the ash trees

Miami-Cass REMC invests over \$125,000 each year on tree trimming and removal. This investment pays tremendous dividends during severe weather by reducing the number of outages that our consumer-members experience. Tree maintenance is one of the many ways your co-op makes our service to you more reliable.

Many of our members have reported dead ash trees near our power lines. Unfortunately, we are not able to get to all of these dead ash trees. Luckily, these trees are a hardwood species and it takes a long time for them to decay and become a risk to our power lines. Eventually, they will become an issue, but we do have a tree removal plan in place to prevent these ash trees from becoming an issue. maintenance company to trim and remove trees that are problematic to our ability to deliver electricity to your homes. The tree trimmers are in the area of two of our substations each year. For 2020, the tree trimmers will be working in the central part of our territory (Grissom and Peru subs) which serves our members.

If you would like to remove an ash tree or any other tree before we get to your area, just call our office and we will drop the line for free. Please give us a notification a few days in advance unless it is an emergency situation.

#### **BUSINESS PROFILE**

## A passion to protect



Koch Fertilizer, LLC, sits on 35 acres just outside of Walton. It is part of the Koch Ag and Energy Solutions, a subsidiary of the multi-national business Koch Industries. The facility is just one of 17 ammonia terminals, located in seven different states, operated by the company. The facility was constructed in 1972 and has the capacity to store up to 22 million gallons of ammonia in its two storage tanks.

The facility employs four full-time employees and is a storage and distribution hub that sells ammonia product which is distributed via tanker trucks to co-ops and independent retailers located in north central Indiana, and parts of Michigan, Ohio and Illinois. Most of the ammonia is sold as fertilizer, which eventually ends up being injected into the ground as a vital nitrogen source in helping farmers produce the desired yield of corn.

The ammonia is piped into the hub via an underline pipeline that starts in New Orleans and runs up the Midwest branching west to Nebraska and east to Indiana. Much of the ammonia supplied to New Orleans is produced internationally, with Venezuela being a large producer. Koch Fertilizer has a "Passion to Protect" vision. It operates every day to create valuable products using fewer resources. The company operates under the philosophy of 10,000% compliance. That's 100% of its employees compliant 100% of the time. So, during much of the year, Koch Fertilizer employees are preparing and maintaining the facility for the distribution that takes place for the most part just three times a year.
